**Kids Power Up With Prayer
Paul and Silas Praise God**

Scripture Text: Acts 16:12-40
Memory Verse: "It is a good thing to give thanks unto the LORD, and to sing praises unto thy name, O most High" (Psalm 92:1).
Lesson Objective: To involve the children in praising God.
Power Line: There's power in praise!

Preparation

Make copies of the praise report cards on cardstock. (See the Art file.) Cut these apart. Place them along with pencils and a basket on a table near the door. After the children have written their praise reports, a helper picks four or five reports and secretly tells these children that they have been chosen to be the "mystery voices" on the Talk of the Church program. He keeps their cards separate from the others. At the beginning of the Talk of the Church show, he signals them to join him "behind the curtain."

On a table on the platform place the objects for the Truth Conductor that were used in service 1, (except for the pitcher of water and bag of dirt) plus four more soda bottles with screw-on lids.

At various times during the service Mike interrupts with "breaking news from Philippi" to present the background for the Bible story. Two older children (boys or girls) help as the roving reporter and the VIP. Give these children their scripts and practice with them.

Make a large cue card for the audience. On one side print, SHOUT AND BOO! On the other side print, QUIET.

For Ask Pete write call-in questions on index cards. "Why do we raise our hands when we praise the Lord?" "In church I hear people shouting 'hallelujah.' What does it mean?" "Some people run when they

praise God. Why do they do that?" "I'm kinda shy. Do I have to get loud to praise the Lord?" You can adapt these questions to fit what you think your children need to know.

Mike carries his offering in change in his pocket. It needs to include at least two pennies. For the Quiz Kids, print the memory verse on a whiteboard: "It is a _____ thing to give _____s unto the LORD, and to _____s unto thy name, O most _____" (____ 92:1). Place the board beside the quiz kids table and turn it away from the audience. Attach the blown-up balloons to the whiteboard.

Several segments of this program are designed to let the children help with the broadcast. Make copies of these parts.

POWER of Worship

Welcome to KPUR (5-6 minutes)

As the children enter, the members of the Kids Prayer Up Radio staff greet them. Ask each child if he has a praise report he would like to write on a card. Ask an older child to help preschoolers write their reports.

The program director opens the service by leading the children in prayer. As he welcomes the guests, Mike starts sniffing and wiping his eyes; his crying escalates until he is sobbing.

P.D.: **Mike, whatever is wrong with you?**

MIKE: (chokes on sobs) **Don't you know?**

P.D.: **No, I don't. Here I am welcoming our guests and you start sobbing.**

MIKE: (sniffs) **You of all people should blow . . . I mean know.**

P.D.: **Well, I don't. No one has died. You're not sick. You haven't lost power. (remembers) I don't think you've lost power. Have you?**

MIKE: **I-I-I don't think so. We'll know when it's (sobs escalate) time to go on the air!**

P.D.: (pats him) **Mike, don't you want to go on the air?**

MIKE: (heart-broken) **Of . . . of course, I do. It's just that . . . just that . . . Oh, I can't say it.**

P.D.: (getting exasperated) **Yes, you can. Just say it.**

MIKE: (sniffs) **This is the last service of this children's prayer revival. That means that means that when we go off the air at the end of the service, (voice raises) KPUR is thistory . . . I mean history! And so am I! (puts face in hands and dissolves into sobs)**

P.D.: **Mike, calm yourself. You are forgetting something.**

MIKE: (peeks through fingers) **I am?**

P.D.: **Yes, you are. You are forgetting the Kids Power Up radio program. You still have a lot of work to do.**

MIKE: (brightens) **Say, that's right. I get to be on Kids Power Up every week, and these kids can listen to me for the rest of their lives.**

P.D.: (laughs) **That's a long time, Mike. But they can hear you anytime by going to the Kids Power Up Web site www.kidspowerup.com.**

MIKE: (excited) **And remember, kids. There will be a new program online every tweek . . . I mean every creek . . . (frustrated) every week!**

P.D.: **Now it's time to go on the air. Is everyone ready? (As he calls their names, the characters**

MIKE: (taps the microphone) **This is KPUR, Kids Power Up Radio, signing on. Welcome, boys and girls, to the most exciting radio station that you have ever heard. We are thrilled that you tuned in. Our first program of the day is Melody's Music Show. And here is the host-ess, Melody the Keyboard.**

Melody's Music Show (8-10 minutes)

Melody plays a few bars to introduce the program. She welcomes the kids to her music show and invites them to participate in making a joyful noise unto the Lord.

Let's take a minute now to hear from our sponsor. Plays music lead in.

MIKE: **Word Aflame Publications—WAP. (pronounced as a word) Wap! Wap! Wap! Oh, sorry, I got a bit carried away there. W-A-P (letters of the alphabet) stands for Word Aflame Publications, the producer of the church's best Sunday school literature. WAP curriculum sparkles, sizzles, and uhhh . . . uhhh . . . (mutter) Oh, what's another word**

that starts with “s”? (snaps his fingers) **I got it—shines. All you kids in our live audience and those listening on your radio, echo this slogan after me. WAP (WAP) curriculum (curriculum) sparkles (sparkles), sizzles (sizzles), and shines (shines). Let's hear it for WAP. (Kids cheer.)**

The theme of this service is praise. Melody leads the children in exciting, uplifting praise choruses.

Some suggestions are:

“Prayer Bells of Heaven” (with a bell choir, puppets, or lip-synched)

“How Great Is Our God”

“I've Got a Right to Praise the Lord”

“Lift Your Praises to the Lord” (This is a good chorus for a wave offering. Give each child a tissue to wave. Explain that wave offerings were a part of Old Testament worship.)

Between the choruses Melody leads the children in shouting the power line: **There's power in praise!**

At some point during this program, Mike comes to the microphone and interrupts with “breaking news.”

MIKE: (taps microphone) **Hello? Am I on? One—two—three. Can you hear me? (all business) We interrupt this program to bring you the latest breaking news from KPUR. A strange-looking band of four men has been seen around Philippi for several days. A well-respected citizen has just reported to our station that these men were seen headed for the river, where it is known that a group of women meet every Sabbath for prayer. No one seems to know why these men are going to a women's prayer meeting. Everyone is urged to be on the alert. If you see anything suspicious, please report it immediately to the local authorities. Rest assured that you can depend on KPUR to keep you updated on the whereabouts of these men. So stayed tuned. This is Mike, your news reporter, signing out.**

MELODY: (closing this program) **Thanks for helping me, kids. See you in church (next service).**

Melody plays the sign-off theme music.

Prayer Hour (8-10 minutes)

(The program director leads this segment.) As Melody softly plays a worship chorus, welcome the listeners to the Prayer Hour program, “where we plug into the power of God through prayer.”

Truth Conductor

Move to the table holding the objects. **Let's see how much we learned the first service.** Ask questions to lead the children through a review of the lesson taught with these objects.

Bring out several empty soda bottles with the lids on. Set them in the cake pan. Call a child up to be your helper. Get him as involved in the process as possible. **The Bible tells us in Joel 2:28-29 and Acts 2:17-18, that in the last days God will pour out His Spirit upon all men. That includes boys and girls, too.**

Remember this big jar of water represents our big God. Today God is pouring out His Spirit upon people everywhere. Pour water from the wide-mouthed jar on the bottles. **People everywhere are being touched by the Spirit of God. But not everyone who feels the Spirit of God is filled. Why not? Why aren't these bottles being filled with water?** The lids are on. **So to fill these bottles, what should we do?** Take off the lids. Do so.

Pour more water on the bottles. Hmmm . . . a little water is going into some of the bottles, but they are not being filled. So what do we need to fill these bottles? A funnel. Bring out the funnel and fill a bottle or two. When we use a funnel, the water goes into the bottle, starting at the bottom and filling up, up, up, until it pours out the mouth.

To be filled with God's Spirit—to receive the Holy Ghost—open your mouth, lift your hands to make a funnel, and praise the Lord. God wants to fill you with His Spirit. He just needs you to praise Him so He can pour His Spirit into you.

And how will you know when you are filled with the Holy Ghost? **Response.** The Spirit will overflow. Out of your mouth will flow words you do not understand, words that the Spirit is speaking through you. You will speak with other tongues.

Ask the children who have received the Holy Ghost to come to the microphone and tell the other children what they were doing when they were filled with God's Spirit.

Conclude the Prayer Hour by leading the children in a praise break. As the children's praises go up, God's Spirit can be poured out upon them and they can be filled with the Holy Ghost. **There's power in praise.**

Talk of the Church (6-8 minutes)

Melody gives the musical lead-in. As Mike introduces this program, a helper motions for the children who were chosen to be the mystery voice to join him behind the curtain. Once they are hidden, he whispers that when he points at a child, he is to read his praise report into the microphone, disguising his voice as much as possible.

MIKE: **It's the Chalk of the . . . I mean Talk of the Church with me, Mike the Microphone, your host. Exciting things have been happening at (*church name*). God has been answering prayer! Since this program is the most diverse program on the air, we are bringing to you "mystery voices" from the shoe . . . I mean pew. But before we hear from our first mystery voice, (*child's name*) has a mystery testimony for you, taken from a kids POWER hour *Joyful Hands* lesson. Oh, yes, one more clue—they got it from the Bible. When (*child*) asks for this mystery person's name, shout it out, but not before.**

MUSIC: INTERLUDE

CHILD: I thought I was on God's side,
But I was only full of pride.
A light from heaven knocked me down,
I got up blind, from the ground.
That's the day I was changed,
God my life rearranged.
Instead of taking saints to jail,
I was the one who needed bail.
Even my name was not the same.
Can you tell me my new name? **(Paul)**

MUSIC: TRANSITION

MIKE: **Good job! Now help me welcome the first mystery voice. Give me a drumroll, kids.** (drum roll) The first child behind the curtain reads his praise report in a disguised voice. The audience identifies him. As Mike introduces each mystery voice (second, third, fourth), the audience gives a drum roll. Continue until all mystery voices have been identified. Call a child to the front and gives him the basket containing the rest of the praise reports. Ask him to hold the basket as high as he can while the other children gather around (or reach their hands out toward the basket), and praise God for the answering prayer.

MIKE: **This is Mike the Microphone, your Talk of the Church host, signing off until next time. (*chokes and sobs*) I just remembered this is the last Talk of the Church program. Oh, it is so sad, but not as sad as it was before (*program director's name*) reminded me that you can always find me at www.kidspowerup.com. Thanks for tuning in to Chalk of the . . . I mean Talk of the Church.**

Melody plays the sign-off music.

Ask Pete (5-6 minutes)

As Melody provides the lead-in music, the roving reporter goes behind the screen.

PETE: **Welcome to Ask Pete, the most dynamic talk show on radio. I am your host, Pete the Pulpit. Over the years hundreds, yea thousands, of sermons have been—**

MIKE: (*interrupts, tapping the microphone*) **Am I on? Yes, I am. I interrupt this program to bring you the latest breaking news about the strange men who were last seen headed for the river where a women's prayer meeting is in progress. Our roving reporter, (*child's name*) reports that strange things have been happening down by the river. Come in (*name*). Can you hear me? The roving reporter speaks in a hushed, mysterious voice.**

RR: **I hear you, Mike. Please, tone it down.**

MIKE: **Tell us what you are seeing.**

RR: **One of these guys is standing in the river. One of the women . . . it's hard to tell who it is**

from where I am hiding behind this tree . . . but it looks like Lydia.

MIKE: Lydia? You mean the well-to-do, well-known business woman? The seller of purple?RR: Yeah. I think it's her. She has just waded out to where he is standing. He's looking up and saying something. I can't hear it . . . but, oh dear me! (*panicked*) He can't be, but he's—

MIKE: What? What is this guy doing?

RR: Oh, it's terrible! He's drowning her. He's—whew! No, he's not. He brought her back up.

MIKE: And what is she doing?

RR: She's waving her hands in the air like a wild woman and shouting so loudly I can hear, even from way back here behind this tree.

MIKE: Is she calling for help? Why aren't you out there helping her?

RR: (*surprised*) She's not calling for help. She's shouting, "Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord!"

MIKE: Praise the Lo—oh, (*name*), I know what's happening. That guy just baptized her.

RR: Baptized her? You mean those guys are Christians?

MIKE: Yes. You got it.

RR: Well, the authorities aren't going to be happy about the Christians coming to Philippi. I'd better sign off and get back to town and spread the word.

MIKE: Yes, and be quick about it. Anything can happen! So stay tuned, boys and girls, for the next breaking news report from KPUR. And now back to Pete the Pulpit and your favorite talk show, Ask Pete.

PETE: As I was saying before I was interrupted, over the years hundreds, yea thousands, of sermons have been preached over me. Now is your chance to Ask Pete your questions about the subject of the day—praise.

Pete talks about how praise not only lifts up Jesus, it makes the "praiser" feel better. Then he opens the lines for callers. Encourage the children who do not have written questions to call in with any questions they might have. Use this time to explain Pentecostal worship. Pete concludes by reminding the children that **praise is powerful** and thanking them for their calls. Melody plays the sign-out music.

Money Market Report (3-4 minutes)

Melody plays the lead-in music, preferably a marching tune.

CHILD: Welcome to the Money Market Report. This is (*name*), your financial advisor. Today's money secret is hard to believe. In fact, it is almost unbelievable. Yet it is true. (*slowly*) A little can be more than a lot.

MIKE: Now, just a minute. How can a lot be more than a li—I mean, a little be more than a lot?

CHILD: It's like this. Once Jesus was watching some people give their offerings. Some rich guys were giving a lot, like hundred dollar bills, and looking around to be sure everyone knew how much they were dropping into the offering plate. A little widow only had two pennies. She quietly dropped them in, hoping no one saw her. Jesus said she gave more than the rich guys.

MIKE: (*pulls out two pennies*) Hey, that's good news. Does that mean if I just give two pennies that's a lot?

CHILD: That's not what I said. I said that a little *can be* more than a lot.

MIKE: So how can two pennies be more than a hundred dollars?

CHILD: Jesus said her two pennies were more than the rich guys' offerings because it was all she had. The guys had a lot more money that they could have given but didn't.

MIKE: Ah-ha! So a little is more than a lot, if the little is all a person has.

CHILD: Right. God counts what's left, not what's given.

MIKE: (*scratches his head*) Well, I better think about this. I was just going to give two pennies, but maybe I should give all I have in my pocket. Pulls out a handful of change. It's not a lot, but it's all so it's a lot for me.

CHILD: You got it, Mike. And that, kids, is the money market secret of the day—a little can be more than

a lot. This is (name), KPUR's financial advisor, signing off.

The program director gives instructions on how the children are to march to give. Melody leads them in a marching chorus.

Power of the Word

Quiz Kids (8-10 minutes)

MIKE: **And now, boys and girls, KPUR is pleased to bring to you the quiz program that tops all quiz programs. It's Save the Balloons! And here is our quiz master, Ben the Bible. Let's hear it for Ben!** (*applause*)

Melody plays sign-in theme music as Ben comes to the microphone. He chooses four school-age children to be the quiz kids, and another one to be the balloon popper. They take their places on the platform. Conduct the quiz as before.

While the quiz kids are being seated, Mike interrupts with another news report.

MIKE: (taps the microphone) **I interrupt this program to bring you the latest report on the happening in Acts chapter 16. The whole pound of . . . I mean town of Philippi is in an uproar.** Holds up flashcard.

KIDS: **shout and boo**

MIKE: **I'm gonna move over here on this side so you can hear above the roar of the crowd.** Move to one side of the platform. Turn the sign over so the kids hush. **It seems that the men we have been following have upset some P-I-Vs, I mean V-I-Ps, very important people. One of them is standing here right now, ready to tell us what happened.**

VIP: (angrily) **I'll tell you! I sure will! These guys came to town and they—**

MIKE: **Pardon me, but do you know their names?**

VIP: **The leader is Paul and the other guy who's always by his side is Silas. I think there's a Couple more guys named Luke and Timothy. But it's this Paul and Silas who have ruined my business. And not just my business, it's my partners' business, too. We're sure to go bankrupt, starve to death.**

MIKE: **How did Saul and Pilas, I mean, Paul and Silas do that?**

VIP: **Well, we have this little gal who makes money for us.**

MIKE: **She's your employee?**

VIP: **Well, employee . . . slave . . . whatever you want to call her. She has . . . I mean *had* this spirit in her, and she could tell people what was going to happen in the future. She made a lot of money for us.**

MIKE: **Oh, a fortune-teller?**

VIP: **Yeah. She used to be! Then these Christians came to town.**

MIKE: **I don't understand. What did Saul and Pil . . . Paul and Silas do?**

VIP: **Ruined our business, I told you!**

MIKE: **But how?**

VIP: **Well, this little slave gal of ours was following them around screaming at the top of her lungs, "These men are the servants of the most high God, which shew unto us the way of salvation." And they didn't like it, not one bit.**

MIKE: **Aren't they?**

VIP: **Aren't they what?**

MIKE: **Yeah, I guess they are. At least, that's what people are saying.**

MIKE: **Then why didn't they like for her to say it?**

VIP: **How would I know? Maybe they didn't want the demon in this gal advertising for them. Anyway, they cast this spirit out of her. Now she's just like anybody else. (disgusted) Couldn't tell you your fortune if her life depended on it!**

MIKE: **So now she can't make money for you, and you're upset. What do you and your partners plan to do about it?**

VIP: **We already gone to the law enforcement office and pressed charges against these guys. It's really got this town stirred up. Let's just go back out there and listen.**

They move back to the center of the platform. Mike holds up the "shout and boo" sign.

KIDS: shout and boo. Mike and the VIP put hands over their ears. Mike turns the sign. Children hush.

MIKE: **So what's going to happen now?**

VIP: **The officers are going to beat these guys, I hope!**

MIKE: **Beat them for delivering this girl from a demon?**

VIP: (rather embarrassed) **Well, that's not exactly what we told the officers. We told them that these guys were causing a lot of trouble. And that's the truth. They're causing me and my partners a lot of trouble. And we told the officers that Paul and Silas were teaching people to break the law.**

MIKE: **Were they?**

VIP: **Well, don't be so technical. It just depends on how you read the law. Now I'm going to get over there and make sure these guys get what they've got coming to them. Returns to his seat.**

MIKE: **And there he goes, folks. Stay tuned for the latest development in Philippi. Until next time this is Mike with KPUR signing off.**

Ben returns to the air and continues with the Quiz Kids program.

Here are the clues.

This is the opposite of bad. (**good**)

When someone does something nice for you, you say, "_____ you." (**thank**)

In Melody's Music Show she asked us to do this. (**sing**)

We sing and raise our hands to _____ the Lord. (**praise**)

This is the opposite of low. (**high**)

This is the longest book in the Bible. (**Psalms**)

Answers: "**It is a good thing to give thanks unto the LORD, and to sing praises unto thy name, O most high**" (**Psalm 92:1**).

Ben talks about how praise is "good" not only for God, but for us. He makes a big deal of announcing how many balloons the quiz kids have saved and encourages the audience to hoop and holler. Give the quiz kids a loud round of applause.

MIKE: **And now let's hear it for our host, Ben the Bible.**

KIDS: (*applause and cheer*)

MIKE: **Thank you for tuning in to Save the Balloons.**

Melody plays sign-off music as Mike announces the call letters of the station.

An Inspirational Moment (2-3 minutes)

Melody leads the children in a quiet worship chorus to prepare them for the Bible story.

Kids Power Up (10-12 minutes)

Illustrated Sermon

Melody plays the lead-in music.

MIKE: **Now for the high point of our day—the drama that will you will never forget it. Here is our host, Pulpit the Pete . . . Oops! I mean Pete the Pulpit.**

PETE: **Thank you, Mike, and thank you, boys and girls, for coming to visit us at KPUR. Tonight's drama is entitled (*eyes get big and he puts his hand over his mouth*) "Jail Break!" And it comes from the sixteenth chapter of Acts.**

MUSIC: TRANSITION

Pete picks up with the story where Mike's newscasts left off. **The uproar in Philippi turned into a riot! The officers stripped Paul and Silas' clothes off their back and beat them horribly. Then they threw them into prison and warned the jailer to guard them carefully so they could not escape. So he threw them into the inner prison. Prisons in those days were far worse than prisons today. They were made of stone—cold, damp, dirty stones. Little streams of polluted water trickled down the wall, forming pools of mud on the filthy, cold, dirt floors. Insects, roaches, and rats crawled everywhere. And it was pitch dark. There were no toilet facilities, so the sewage mixed with the mud. It was beyond horrible. The guards were strong, heartless men who almost whipped the prisoners to death.**

After Paul and Silas were stripped and beaten, they were dumped into one of these dungeons. Their feet were put in wooden stocks that locked them in a painful position. Their wrists were cuffed by rusty chains that rubbed and broke the skin. The smell was sickening. The sounds of rats and insects scurrying and prisoners in other cells cursing and moaning was frightening. The taste of blood in their mouths was nauseating. The sight was . . . well, there was no sight. It was so dark they could not see the rats than ran over their feet and the insects that landed on their bloody backs. They could only feel the insects grabbing and biting, as their muscles twitched and throbbed. Paul and Silas had to make a decision. They could whine and cry, or they could sing and praise God. They knew that **praise is powerful** so they decided to praise God, even though it was midnight. They knew it would make them feel better.

Most of the songs they knew were from the Book of Psalms. Perhaps they sang Psalm 92:1. (*make up a tune and sing*) **"It is a good thing to give thanks unto the LORD, and to sing praises unto thy name, O most High."** Ask the children to sing along with you.

After you sing it a couple of times, Mike comes to the microphone.

MIKE: (speaks in a trembling voice; holds onto the microphone stand and swaying) **We interrupt this story with breaking news. The earth is shaking. I can hardly stand on my feet. It's an earthquake. Everyone is urged to get outside now! Take your portable radios with you and get out! Immediately! I'm standing just outside the prison. If the prisoners escape, we could be in danger. Stay tuned.**

Pete continues. **The earthquake did break open the prison door. Then it stopped as quickly as it had started. The jailer was startled out of sleep. When he realized what had happened, he pulled out his sword and was about to kill himself. He knew that if the prisoners escaped, the officers would hold him accountable and kill him. "Stop!" Paul yelled. "Don't hurt yourself. No one has escaped. We are all here." The jailer called for a light and looked around. Sure enough, not one prisoner had escaped. The earth had stopped shaking, but the jailer's knees hadn't. He fell down trembling before Paul and Silas and asked, "What must I do to be saved?" That was exactly what they wanted to him to ask. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved," they said. The jailer took Paul and Silas to his house where they preached to him and his family.**

MUSIC: TRANSITION

MIKE: (taps microphone) **One-two-three-test. This is Mike with KPUR and the morning news. What a night we had in Philippi. An earthquake and a jail break—no wait, that's not right. No one broke out of jail even though the doors were burst open by the earthquake. Two of the prisoners, Paul and Silas, the Christians who have had Philippi in an uproar, went to the jailer's house. We have been told by an unnamed, but reliable source, that the jailer and his family were baptized last night. This morning the city council sent word to the men asking Paul and his friends to leave town peacefully. But Paul refused, saying that they were Roman citizens, and they had been mistreated. He demanded that the officials of the city come to them and apologize. The officials were frightened when they heard that these men were Roman citizens because the law forbids them to beat Roman citizens. So they went in person to see Paul and Silas. The media was barred from that meeting so we do not know what happened. But we do know that after the meeting Paul and Silas stopped by the house of Lydia, the seller of purple. A little later Paul and his band of men were seen leaving town.**

MUSIC: TRANSITION

Invitation and Prayer (5-7 minutes)

God dwells in the middle of praise. When we praise Him, we get His attention. When Paul and Silas decided to praise God in the prison, the power of God moved in and shook the earth. Praise is powerful.

If you need the Holy Ghost or healing or help from God in any way, come to the front. It's time to take the lid off our mouths, make a funnel with our arms, and praise the Lord.

As Melody plays a praise chorus, the altar workers gather around the children and pray with them. May God's Spirit rain down on this last night of the children's prayer revival.

Plug in

Close with victory reports, thanking God for what He has done for the children and for the church in these three services. Be sure that every child knows when the regular church services are and make arrangements for transportation for any who need a ride.

The services are over, but the revival goes on. Make sure the outreach team has the name and address of every child who visited.
